This piece was accepted into the Excellence in Quilts' Fiber Art Now publication, Fall 2023, in the wall art category.



I managed to make a quilt for the Valley South exhibit that will open at the beginning of 2024, venue to be determined. The theme is the 5 elements. I had done one on fire earlier, maybe15 years ago that was too small. This is similar but larger, has batting in it, all silk, except for the backing and edge, hand-dyed, and layered so that the symbol almost looks like a human figure in a flame.

Also, after 2 years of doing very little other than getting over a nasty case of cancer, I decided to see if I still had it in me to manage a big show. So, I got permission to hold an Art Show at my residence park, a group of about 190 independent senior residences and invited all artists to participate. We used the clubhouse for our venue, as I had done before, about 2018, and ended up with several painters and three quilters, and some other needlework artists. It was a very successful event. I did manage to keep my wits about me and have gotten many happy comments from the residents. I wasn't sure I could handle it, because the cancer treatments really messed up my ability to think, but it came out fine and the group was wonderful.

My piece, In Memorium, has been juried into Material World: A Contemporary Fiber Art Exhibition sponsored by the ArtsCouncil Fayetteville/Cumberland County, North Carolina. It opens Friday, July 28, 2023 and runs through Saturday, September 9, 2023.

Created to remember the 12 people killed at a Lunar New Year celebration in January, it has detritus from left over Lunar Year celebrations. A broken heart represents the families torn apart, lucky candy wrappers, hom bao envelopes and the names of the twelve written on 12 torn hearts.
